
# LIFE WATER CANADA 2023 ANNUAL REPORT

Lifewater Canada donors significantly improved the lives of 1,351,436 people in Africa and Haiti through new wells, rehabilitated wells, repaired pumps and rain catchments!

- 143,311 people from 329 new water wells
- 189,754 people from 417 broken-down wells that were rehabilitated.
- 1,007,543 people from 2,468 hand pumps that were repaired.
- 4,278 people from 43 new rainwater catchment and storage systems
- 6,550 people from 25 new community toilets and handwash stations

Included in this total is **163,943** people who also received support and training through Health and Hygiene seminars.

# We completed 3,662 water projects in fiscal 2023 after 2,093 the previous year – a record accomplishment coming out of a global pandemic.

With travel opening we have been able to visit 3 nations in 4 trips which has contributed to the significant increase in productivity. We have been able to help them with administration and workflow needs, facilitate with equipment support, as well as starting up 2 new teams – one in Kenya and the other in Liberia.








# WORKING FOR IMPACT THAT LASTS

Taking the time to step back and measure outcomes has always been important to us, and the recent global shutdown gave us an opportunity to work more closely with our in-country coordinators and teams to increase and validate the data that we collect. As a result of this increase, we have shifted slightly in how we serve the communities and villages in which we work.

The ability to change and adapt without losing one's identity is a hard fought and learned asset that we believe is an absolute if we are to continue serving well in the future. With that in mind, this last year saw a shift in how we do things while maintaining the core of what we do and why we do it. We have been working steadily within our partner nations to better serve individual communities by holistically assessing the drinking water access, sanitation, and hygiene needs of that community. The clustering of efforts and resources completely meets the community needs and is magnifying the impact of our collective work. So, rather than a single well or pump repair, a village may see several pump repairs or rehabilitations, enough new wells to maintain ready and reasonable access, a community toilet, and enough Health & Hygiene Seminars to blanket the population with knowledge.

Combined, these actions are putting less stress on a village's infrastructure, while empowering and equipping the population to care for that infrastructure, and one another. And that means a longer lasting impact.





Most of us understand the significant value of time. To many, it is the most valuable resource of all. Unlike every other resource in this world, it is the one that is the same for us all. Whether you live in suburban North America of Sub-Saharan Africa, your allotment is the same. 1,440 minutes a day is all you get.

While our work can not create time from nothing, one of our joys is measuring the time that our work redeems. We have heard countless stories and read countless letters from those we have the joy to serve, and those stories share a common factor, and that is time.

In November 2022, I had the opportunity to travel to Mwingi, in northeastern Kenya, to build and help train a new team on the operation of a newly-in-service LS300+ truck-mounted drilling rig. The team, along with some skilled volunteers, completed the machine and were drilling the maiden borehole at Mwambiu Secondary School, deep in the bush. As we were drilling around the clock, the team split into shifts, which meant late night travel from our sleeping quarters to the drill site. On one of those shift changes, we came across a teenage girl walking down the dirt track, and thinking she may appreciate a ride, we stopped to offer. Her response? "No thank you, I am just going for water before school." It was 3:30am, and we were 8km from her home. She would go on to make two trips for water, carrying two 20L jerry cans before sunrise, and be in class in time for her exams.

That well came into full service in February of 2023, and as a beautiful peripheral outcome of providing access to the resource of water, that girl, along with over 1.3 million other people, have seen that time redeemed. On average, each and every household that benefits from Lifewater Canada's work redeems 71.4 minutes each and every day. Time that we didn't create but has been made available again.

# REGIONAL UPDATES

# HAIT

The Haiti team remains streamlined for maximum efficiency, with a total of 6 team members, their hard work and dedication resulted in 38 new wells, 3 Well Rehabilitations, and another near record year of repairs, completing 714 repairs! We are tremendously proud of this group, as even though they face danger and discouragement on a daily basis, they continue to press on to see their countrymen impacted through safe and accessible water, over 236,000 in this past year alone!

Lifewater Haiti struggled with major supply chain issues and fuel shortages, as well as the ongoing national turmoil that Haiti has been suffering from. Gang violence remains an increasing danger, and the political climate has yet to stabilize.

Despite all of this, the team continues to work strongly. They are focusing on reducing the number of active users on each pump to facilitate longevity, planning for long term supply and inventory so that work does not get interrupted, and stepping up on equipment maintenance and repair programs to avoid downtime.

# BERIA

After the sudden loss of Jim Gehrels (Lifewater Canada Founder) and father to the team, the existing Liberia team struggled for direction. When COVID hit the world in 2020, we learned very quickly that depth of trust and relationship is valuable but could not hinge solely on the kind of strong in-person presence that Jim offered this team. While there were some long months of frustration, we were eventually able to build the type of partnership that is needed to carry out our collective work in Liberia.

In October 2022, we traveled to Liberia for the first trip since early 2019 and began the process of restructuring the Liberian initiative. Drawing from our experiences with similar structures, we introduced the concept of multiple teams dividing the work of WASH programming, each focusing on their areas of strengths and interest, yet harmonizing with the other to serve communities. While met with great resistance at first, in April of 2023 we launched Liberia with 2 working teams, Lifewater Liberia Inc remains as our oldest team, now exclusive to drilling and rehabilitating wells, and Service to Servants – Lifewater, who focus on pump repair, health & hygiene, and community latrines. This also required moving L-Linc's existing Program Coordinator into a new Country Coordinator role, managing Community Assessments and requests, and balancing the work between the two teams. The outcomes of this new direction have been miraculous and deeply inspiring.

### LIFEWATER LIBERIA INC.

With a significant change to the L-Linc board, as well as a new Program Coordinator, our oldest team has a new vigor and renewed passion for the work. Retaining only the drilling team and direct support staff, and using a rental drill rig as required, this group completed 11 wells in the 3 months after restructure, after completing 9 in the first 9 months of the year, as well as 14 rehabilitated wells. Focusing on repairs and maintenance to existing equipment, their fleet is as strong as it currently can be. With new accounting practices and an actively engaged board, they also immediately began saving funds for a new drilling rig, which we hope will be put into service in this fiscal year.

### STS-LIFEWATER

A long-standing relationship with USA based International NGO known as STS – Service to Servants, has now birthed our second Liberian partner, STS – Lifewater. Working independently under Program Coordinator Joe Sloan, this team consists of the remaining staff from L-Linc as well as a few new trainees. Based in a compound jointly shared by Lifewater and STS, our trip in April completed the office and volunteer housing projects, and 3 vehicles to launch the pump repair program. In the final 3 months of our last fiscal year, this new team successfully completed 423 pump repairs and 66 health & hygiene classes. Their goal for this fiscal? 2080 REPAIRS!! And if donations allow, this is not out of reach.

# BERIA (CONT.)

# NGERIA

It was another incredible year for Hosea and his team. Officially completing his NGO Registration and now known as Lifewater Hygiene Initiative of Nigeria (LHIN), this group completed over 1200 water projects in a 12-month period! To say that this is a miraculous feat would be an understatement, and at the same time, we must recognize the dedicated team and excellent management that is also involved in serving nearly 325,000 Nigerian men, women, and children.

Pump shipments from India have been a regular part of our work in Nigeria this past year, and Hosea's local work included completing the compound, shop, and office, as well as adding to the LHIN fleet of vehicles with a capable 4x4 cube van to act as a parts depot for long excursions into the deep rural regions.

In response to the vast amount of work in this country, we have initiated the construction of a truck mounted drilling rig for this team, similar the one that was put into service in Kenya in late 2022. This will be a modified LS300+ hydraulic rig mounted on an Isuzu NPS chassis, with mud rotary and air drilling capacity on board. Hosea, as an experienced driller, has been spending time working with other national teams doing training, and in one of those trips, had the opportunity to inspect and operate the LS300 in Kenya, seeing the possibility of moving away from his current rented machines and reaching deep into the remote regions with safe water was exciting to LHIN, and is a project that we are very pleased to partner with him in. We expect that rig to enter service in March of 2024.

# KENYA

Nearly tripling the number of people impacted through our donors' investment in Kenya from the year before, our 3 Kenyan partners continue to work together in their areas of strength. Serving over 325,000 people with a record setting 33 new wells, 430 pump repairs or replacements, 6 latrines, 43 rainwater & handwash stations, and over 1500 Health & Hygiene seminars in schools and communities, this country continues to shine.

### LIFEWATER RESCUE KENYA

After a long wait, the newly recognized national organization of LRK is in full swing. As a team of 5, their sole focus is the operation of the Isuzu mounted LS300 (affectionately known as Jerry) and the support vehicle, an Isuzu 4 door 4x4 pickup (known as Tom), in the remote area of Mwingi in eastern Kenya. Facing incredibly difficult conditions, lack of roads, and harsh environments, this team of 4 drillers has consistently delivered 4 boreholes every month, all drilled on local school grounds with access to students and the public.

Currently, STADA is acting as the pump installation team for this group, allowing the LRK drillers to focus on successful drilling, as well as letting them spend time at home, as the region that they are drilling demands a schedule of being away from home for weeks at a time. LRK drills and caps the boreholes, and then STADA sends an installation team and materials to do the final installation. Though it is a slightly longer process, it allows the staff from both teams the time for family and home.

Though it was a steep learning curve for this group, they have impressed us all with their attention to detail and ability to manage time, resources, and finances effectively and openly. For example, they were able to move from an advance payment model to a payment on a cost recovery basis (project payment sent after final project documentation is sent to Lifewater Canada) in only 3 short months. This is a great accomplishment for a new team!

### STADA

This group always show themselves to be willing, eager, teachable, and adaptable in all situations. Growing in their Health & Hygiene Education program, they have allowed their material to be adapted for use by our other teams, most notably our newest team, Lifewater STS in Liberia.

Along with this, they have expanded their repair teams to 2 teams, capable of up to 60 repairs a month between them. They have grown to include Well Rehabilitations along with their New Wells and Pump Repairs, and expanded their distribution of Dignity Kits, which have proven to be a valuable and impactful addition to our Sanitation and Hygiene program.

In all of this, STADA has proven the desire to work as a partner, rather than as a dependent. They consistently share costs on infrastructure purchases, adding a new (to them) truck and 2 new 3-wheeled motorcycles to their fleet, as well as a 20' shipping container for pump storage.

### THE LIFEWATER KENYA (TLK)

This past fiscal year, The Lifewater Kenya team acted as the unofficial parent group to both STADA and LRK. Without our original team and it's managing Director David Maina, our work in Kenya would not be possible. This team offers assistance in any way asked. From project management, material requisition, troubleshooting, staffing, and government compliance. David, and now his children, Dorcas and Sammy, are absolutely integral to all of our Kenyan work.

We are currently working on finalizing plans to refurbish TLK's trailer mounter rig, creating a smaller version of a truck mounted rig, to relaunch TLK's drilling program. While we do not have a date for this to be completed, our hope is that it can be done in this coming year.

# KENYA (CONT.)



In Kisumu, Kenya, we have been engaged in a survey of those who have directly benefited from our WASH programming. Our intention was simply to verify our reported outcomes, but we have learned so much more. While this is still a small cross section of the individuals we have served together, it is so encouraging to us, and we hope it is to you as well.

These surveys have been distributed to 3 communities in the Kisumu area; Alendu, Kakuongo, and Kasaro; with respondents including school aged girls, their parents, and school officials. All 3 have all benefited from as many WASH programs as needed; new wells drilled where required, all local pumps repaired and operational, dormant wells rehabilitated, latrine access & hand wash stations provided, as well as sanitation and health & hygiene seminars conducted.


Across the board, we see the same thing in these three communities. All schools report zero absenteeism due to water responsibilities or water borne illness and 100% active participation in class. All student respondents reporting improved test scores and improved feelings of security & confidence. Notably, an incredible reduction in dropout due to pregnancy has also been observed, those pregnancies are reported as down by 90%! We attribute this to eradicating the common practice of trading sex for the provision of sanitary napkins or assistance in loading & carrying water.

Lifewater Canada doesn't believe in simply transferring money to fix a problem. We believe in transferring the tools and skills needed to ensure that the communities we partner with are self-sufficient and no longer have to depend on anyone else for a simple human right: access to clean, safe drinking water, and the benefits that come along with that fulfilled right.




